From Our Minister

The seasons turn to spring, or should I say to mud? The sap rises, and we turn it into sweetness. We change, we grow, we emerge. April showers come, we expect, harbingers of May flowers and of rainbows.

What has been hibernating in you? What has been buried deep within the ground? What radical (literally, proceeding from the root) aspect is emerging from your deepest sense of self? Have we, are we, cultivating a space, a community, an ecosystem that encourages thriving, welcomes diversity, celebrates the wholeness of its members and its visitors? What does that even look like?

Many years ago, this congregation became a Welcoming Congregation, committed to welcoming and supporting the needs and concerns of LGBTQ+ people. You have long hung a rainbow flag within your sanctuary, and spoken words of welcome on Sunday mornings. But welcome is an ongoing commitment, a shifting emergence, an active practice. We just hung a Progress Pride flag outside the building, a public marker of this commitment. A flag is a signifier, but more important than the flag is what it signifies. How do we express welcome, especially to people who have experienced oppression around their gender and sexuality? How do we work to make our congregation and the wider society a safe space for LGBTQ+ folks? I was heartened to join with Mary Ahlgren and many friends of the congregation at the Capitol the other week, showing support for and celebration of queer and trans kids. Not only is this a powerful way to incarnate our values, demonstrating support for those whose inherent worth and dignity is tragically being debated. But as your queer minister, this also matters to me on a personal

level. I feel more safe, more supported, and more celebrated in a community that proudly waves its welcome, that recognizes vulnerability but does not succumb to fear, that works to make itself and its wider community more affirming of sexual and gender diversity. And what a difference it makes that you do this *not* because of who I am, but because of who you are and who you want to be.

Coming out, as a queer person as well as an ally, as a congregation that embraces and supports people of all genders and sexualities, is not all rainbows and unicorns and butterflies. There is struggle and conflict and turmoil within and without. There is fear and hesitancy, a wish for things to be easier, a desire to not be different, a want to preserve peace even at the cost of suppressing one's own soul. And there is a deepening in conviction and a growing sensitivity to the struggles of queer people that develop as one starts to recognize the ways we have all internalized homophobia and transphobia, no matter how progressive and welcoming we try to be. There is a recognition that one's own soul matters. And then, past cycles of freeze and thaw, through mud and muck and mess, if we keep going and allow ourselves to be transformed, we emerge into ourselves, souls shining radiantly, moving proudly into the fullness and vibrancy of our own becoming, bursting forth into a spring song.

May we sing this song together, in beautiful and imperfect harmony,



Four days ago, under sunny skies and temperatures close to 60 degrees, I was hopeful that we were finally finished with winter. I am writing this newsletter today, March 28, a day where the wind chill factor makes it feel like 10 degrees. I know that Chris and Jon are looking forward to warmer weather. This is Ben's second winter, so he might be a bit more at home with the cold and the snow.

April is a time for new beginnings, weather wise, garden wise, and spirit wise. For many religions, this is a holy time. Here are a few holidays in April: April 2 – Ramadan; April 15 – Passover; April 17 – Easter; April 23 – Earth Day; April 24 – Pascha (Orthodox Easter).

While you celebrate your religious tradition this month, please think of and pray for the people of Ukraine. There are millions who are now refugees. I am grateful that we are helping Ben, Jon, and Chris on their journeys from war and oppression, through refugee status to asylum seekers and finally, full citizens. I am proud that we all are helping them adjust to a new life here in New Hampshire, and watch them begin to build a more stable, loving time in their lives.

Thank you to all our donors who have helped us offer a safe place for our guests who seek shelter while they wade through our asylum legal system to gain work papers, residency, and citizenship.

Here are some of the ways you can continue to support our Sanctuary/Asylum network: We accept **Market Basket gift cards** and checks to help support Chris as his case slowly works through the courts. Gift cards must be bought in-store, but then can be mailed to UU Manchester c/o Asylum Committee at UU Manchester, 669 Union St. Manchester NH 03104. Or, the cards can be dropped off at church during our new church administrator's hours, M-F, 8am-12 noon. Her name is Amy. **Checks** can be sent to the above address. Designate Asylum in the memo line and if your donation is for general support, specific support for legal fees, or specifically for food. We are a 501(C)3 organization, so your donations are tax-deductible. The History of Arbor Day

Arbor Day is a holiday dedicated to trees that is celebrated in many countries around the world. Trees are a vital part of the world’s ecosystem. This observance serves as a way to both honor the humble and mighty tree and to help replenish the world’s supply by planting them.

The dates of Arbor Day festivities are often in the spring but vary worldwide according to many factors, including when the local conditions are ideal for tree planting. In the U.S., Arbor Day is celebrated annually on the last Friday of April.

The first known tree holiday goes back hundreds of years. It took place in Spain in the village of Mondonedo in 1594. The first Arbor Day in the U.S. was held in Nebraska City, Nebraska, on April 10, 1872. The event was organized by newspaperman Julius Sterling Morton.

Birdsey Grant Northrop of Kent, Connecticut, is credited with popularizing the concept of arbor festivities throughout the U.S. and worldwide. The educator, preacher, farmer, city planner, lecturer, writer, and diplomat came to be known internationally as the “Father of Arbor Day.” Northrop traveled the world extolling the importance of protecting nature and planting trees.
