From Our Minister



Dear Ones, I never imagined being a minister in a time of war.

Granted, our military has been embroiled in conflicts for most if not all of my life. But there is something different about this moment, arising amidst the overwhelm and exhaustion of two years of coronavirus pandemic. The fear and anxiety of the world, right now, as we watch what is happening in Ukraine without really understanding why. This kind of territorial aggression seems like a remnant of a bygone age, except clearly it is not.

Two years ago, I was planning to visit a different landscape torn apart by military occupation and resistance, another place where the dreams of local sovereignty are ignored by superpowers who believe they can shape the world by drawing new maps and then

using their military power to enforce those new boundaries. The cancellation of my anticipated pilgrimage to Israel and Palestine in March 2020 was the first direct impact of the pandemic on my life. We had been monitoring the situation to determine if we would feel safe traveling, but when the borders to Palestine were closed because of coronavirus, our decision was made for us.

That trip was supposed to be the capstone of my final seminary class. I was disappointed that the trip didn't happen, but grateful for the container that class offered for the remainder of the semester to process this new time we had entered, this time of pandemic. In lieu of traveling to the "Holy Land" in the Middle East, I thought about pandemic as pilgrimage. My final project was a collage/map/meditation/tour through the Holy Land and Holy Time that is now, sacred both despite and because it is so terrifying and disorienting.

Nearly two years later, it is clear that many things have changed. We have moved on from that early phase, but we are still on the journey through this unknown terrain. And so, I share this video tour of my Illustrated Holy Land Map; may it help guide you through these ever-trying times.

I wanted to do something different this month, and I requested from our asylum guests to submit a short poem in whatever language they choose. I also asked the committee to submit favorite short poems. Ben sent me the following Langston Hughes poem, titled "Dreams":

Hold fast to dreams For if dreams die Life is a broken-winged bird That cannot fly.

Hold fast to dreams For when dreams go Life is a barren field Frozen with snow.

Chris wrote the following:

For many years I tried so hard to live a life...a normal life but I can't escape this dark shadow that's always creeping up beside me for many years I tried to hide fighting my battles quietly inside afraid to say something and open up. About this dark shadow that's taking over my life. Fearful of being judged and misunderstood I thought hiding it is for the best Thought this dark shadow won't give me a rest. Many nights I cried myself to sleep. Asking why me.... why it had to be me? But I can't seem to find an answer, hope to see my answer soon because I just happened to be an innocent sufferer of this dark shadow that never leaves me Even when I beg and plead.... I remember when I came into the world my father told me to keep my eyes and ears wide open. And to be kind. Love one another. Take care of each other. Tell the truth. Always do your best. Listen to the big

people and the little people. Explore new paths and have fun. Know that you are loved like crazy. Give thanks for all your blessings. About all else, love and you will do wonderful things in this world.

Cultivo una rosa blanca en junio como enero para el amigo sincero que me da su mano franca.

Do you sometimes feel that what we are doing is not important? Here's what our friend Nancy at the Immigrant Solidarity Network expressed to us concerning our contribution to Jon's Green Card Application:

"He wants to be sure that everyone at UU Manchester knows how grateful he is for this support. When he heard about the fee required for the application (the total fee was \$1,125), it kept him up all night trying to figure out how he would pay it. I told him that we would work with the other immigrant advocacy groups in NH and that together we'd be able to swing it. I think he is amazed. Even though I've seen this happen many times now it NEVER ceases to amaze me. It's a glimpse into what the "beloved community" MLK always talked about would actually be like!"
