From Our Minister



Remember that collective sigh of relief we felt at the end of 2020? But then 2021 happened, and 2022, and even as we get more and more used to wearing masks and COVID messing up our plans, I stopped expecting a better year. So how do I, we, turn and face 2023, a year that does not promise peace or an end to the pandemic or climate change, or a fulfillment of our wildest dreams?

With hope. With active hope. With vision and commitment. True, there is so much in the world that we cannot control, but there is also so much that we can. To just let life happen to us because we are overwhelmed is irresponsible use of the powers granted to us in being human. But making change, enacting vision, is also something that we cannot do alone. We need to collaborate, communicate, support each other, and give birth to the kinds

of new ideas that only arise in connection with others.

This is my hope for UUCF in the new year — that we will lean into new ways of collaborating in this shared ministry, ways that support the wider community of Franklin, the congregation as a whole, and the individuals who comprise it. That we will inspire and support each other with new initiatives and old projects, activities that feel generative and exciting and help us feel new energy for engagement. That we will identify what hasn't been working so well, what is zapping us of strength and resources, and find ourselves able to name and move away from old patterns that are no longer serving us. That we may support each other in tending to the dreams of our hearts.

I don't know what all we need to commit to such resolutions, but I do have a few things planned to start us off.

On Sunday, **January 8**, after the service, we will be having an all-congregation workshop and meeting from **11:30-1** with UUA staff Rev. Erica Baron. This will be held at the meetinghouse, unless there is inclement weather, in which case we will all meet over Zoom. Erica has worked with many congregations in similar situations to us, with declining memberships and expensive buildings and still a lot of life and love. The question the Parish Committee asked Erica to help us explore is this: *What is our direction as a*

congregation that is shrinking and has a heavy financial burden? The only true answer is one that arises organically out of the congregation, so your presence and participation are greatly encouraged. Erica will offer us some guidance in helping find our way.

Another thing I have planned, for later in the year, is a four-session discussion series around the UUA's Common Read for this year, *Mistakes and Miracles: Congregations on the Road to Multiculturalism*. Although the five congregations featured in this book are considerably larger than ours and exist among different demographics, there is still a lot for us to learn - not just from their successes but from the challenges and dynamics that made things difficult. The book is currently on backorder, awaiting another printing, though if you like ebooks you can get started with the Kindle edition. The congregation will be ordering a number of the books directly from the UUA to resell to those of you who are interested. Finally, I am looking forward to attending a webinar, sponsored by the UUA, on "[Singing for Liberation](#)." So that we might sing together, I invite you to join me at the meetinghouse on Tuesday, January 10, at 12:45 pm. If you are interested but unable to join, the webinar recording will be posted on the UUA website in February.

There is more in store, I am sure. I am really looking forward to what this year brings.


